The information we collect about you is called your *personal data*. The table below tells you what we collect, where we collect it from and why we need it.

How we keep your personal data safe

We know how important it is to look after your personal data, so here are some of the things we do to protect it:

- We only use the personal data we really need;
- We train our staff how to use and share your data safely;
- We use security measures like strong passwords and encryption¹;
- We make sure we store and send data using secure technologies;
- We make sure that only people with permission can access your data;
- We only work with companies who promise to look after your data too.

¹ Encryption means we turn your data into a code that can only be read by the people we trust.

How we share your personal data

Sharing your data means letting other people or companies use your data too. They may be in the UK or in another country, including countries outside the European Union (EU). Whenever we do this, we only use organisations that promise to look after your data according to UK law.

The table below tells you about the companies we share with, what we share with them and why. In future, we may use different companies but we will not change the type of data we share, or how it is used, without telling you first.

Who we share with	Why we share		
Dropbox	Dropbox is a service for storing data safely and securely on the Internet. We use it to store our company data, including personal data. Occasionally, Dropbox staff need to access the data we store. Their <u>help page</u> ² explains when and why they might do this.		
Microsoft	We use Microsoft tools like Word, Excel and PowerPoint for things like writing reports and creating documents. This may involve storing some of your data on Microsoft's systems. We also use Microsoft Outlook to send, receive and store emails that may contain your personal data.		
Zoom	We use Zoom video calls to deliver our online services, such as tuition and family SEND support.		
Other professionals	 To provide you with the best possible care, we may share personal data with other professionals where we feel this is necessary. We will only do this if one or more of the following is true: You ask us to; We ask you and you give us permission; We feel that you, or another person, are at risk of harm. 		

How long we keep your personal data

When we collect your data, we only keep it for as long as we need to. The maximum length of time depends on the type of data, as shown in this table:

Type of data	The maximum length of time we keep it
Contact details	7 years after your last contact with us.
Education details	7 years after your last contact with us.

	Parents or guardians: 8 years after your last contact with us
Health details	Children and young people: If you are under 17 when we stop providing you with a service: Until your 25th birthday If you are 17 or older when you leave our service: Until your 26th birthday In the event of your death: 8 years after your death

Once we no longer need your data, we will securely delete it unless we are required by law to keep it.

Your personal data and the law

The law says we must have a good reason to use your data. This is called a *lawful basis* and we have several because we use your data in different ways. The table below tells you which lawful basis we use for each, along with some legal information that you may find useful:

Consent means you give us your permission to use your data. If you change your mind about something you've given your consent for, please let us know and we will stop using your data for that purpose.

Your rights

The law gives you some important rights that help protect you and your personal data:

- The right to be informed
- The right of access
- The right to rectification
- The right to erasure
- The right to restrict processing
- The right to data portability
- The right to object

- ...to know who we are and how we use your data
- ...to find out what data we have about you
- ...to ask us to correct mistakes in your data
- ...to ask us to delete your data
- ...to ask us to limit how we use your data
- ...to ask us to send your data to you or another provider
- ...to complain challenge our use of your data

In some cases, one or more of these rights may not apply – for instance, if we feel it might cause serious harm to you or others. Similarly, even if you are the parent or guardian of a child receiving our services, you may not be entitled to certain rights, depending on the child's age, wishes and the data involved. However, we promise to always consider your rights and respond to you promptly, fairly and within the law.
